ICA ANNUAL STATISTICS 2022

In 2022, Singapore's borders were re-opened fully. The Immigration & Checkpoints Authority (ICA) facilitated the sharp increase in movement of people and goods in and out of the country, while continuing to ensure security at our borders. ICA also kept the immigration offender situation in Singapore under control by conducting rigorous and regular in-land enforcement operations.

Reconnecting Singapore to the world

2 With the full resumption of international travel in 2022, ICA saw a significant increase in traveller volume, clearing nearly 105 million travellers. During the year-end school holidays in December 2022, traveller volume peaked, almost returning to pre-COVID-19 levels at the land checkpoints.

3 While the overall volume of containers, consignments, and parcels cleared in 2022 (9.7 million) saw a dip of 10.5% from the previous year, the volume of low-value goods¹ increased by over 40%, spurred by high internet usage and ease of online shopping. These

¹ Low-value goods are subject to GST relief when they are imported by air/post. They do not require permits and have a total Cost, Insurance and Freight (CIF) not exceeding \$400. This is not applicable to intoxicating liquors and tobacco. From 2022, ICA has included items that are imported via air express with bulk permits into the lowvalue goods category as they also do not require individual permits.

low-value goods were mainly cleared through the air cargo checkpoints. Some examples of low-value goods purchased online include clothing, toys, and sports equipment.

ICA also managed an *unprecedented surge in passport applications in 2022*. Many citizens had put off renewing their expired passport during the two years of travel restrictions amid the COVID-19 pandemic. To deal with the surge, ICA redeployed officers from other work units to process passport applications 24/7 and issued more than 1.25 million passports in 2022. 72% of these were issued between May and October.

Detecting threats at the borders

ICA's core mission is to safeguard Singapore from the entry of undesirable people and goods that may pose security, crime, and health risks to our community. The use of data and technology, coupled with specialised training, has enabled ICA officers to effectively detect and sieve out undesirable travellers and thwart smuggling attempts.

- In recent years, ICA has *deployed multi-modal biometric clearance systems at the checkpoints to better detect travellers attempting to enter Singapore using an impersonated identity or an identity different from their previous trips to Singapore.* They do so to evade detection at the checkpoints, often because they had previously committed or attempted to commit various offences in Singapore, had overstayed, or had been deported.
- 7 In 2022, there was an *increase in the number of multiple identity cases* detected at the checkpoints, by around 15 times.

Increase in number of forged/tampered travel documents detected at checkpoints

8 *ICA officers also detected more travellers attempting to enter Singapore with forged/tampered travel documents.* In 2022, the number of travellers detected with forged/tampered travel documents *increased from one in 2021 to 21 in 2022*.

More attempts at smuggling contraband detected at the checkpoints

9 Similarly, there was an *increase in contraband smuggling attempts* foiled by ICA at the checkpoints in 2022, by about 28.9%.

Despite the surge in traveller volume, ICA officers remained vigilant against attempts to smuggle prohibited items into Singapore. In 2022, ICA successfully foiled multiple attempts to smuggle significant consignments of contraband and illicit drugs into Singapore via the land, air, and sea checkpoints. Huge consignments of contraband cigarettes and drugs were found hidden among legitimate consignments transported by lorries. In some of these cases, the offenders had used sophisticated methods of concealment. These included hiding contraband in the convertible hood, spare tyres, door panels or in various modified compartments in the vehicles. (Refer to Appendix A for related cases.)

Increase in the number of immigration offenders arrested

11 In 2022, there was an *increase in the total number of immigration offenders arrested* by ICA.

Decrease in the number of harbourers and employers of immigration offenders

There was a *drop of around 4% in the total number of harbourers and employers of immigration offenders arrested* by ICA in 2022. The majority of the harbourers arrested in 2022 were either family members or friends of the immigration offenders, who claimed to

have overlooked to extend or renew the offenders' immigration pass or did not check their immigration status. Another group of harbourers arrested had rented/sublet their units or rooms without conducting checks on their tenants' immigration status in Singapore.

- In 2022, most immigration offenders employed by errant employers were found working in the construction, maintenance, and food & beverage industries, or as freelance house cleaners or odd job workers. The majority of the employers had failed to exercise due diligence; they did not conduct checks before employing them or did not ensure that their immigration status in Singapore remained valid throughout the employment period.
- 14 ICA will continue to come down hard on harbourers and employers of immigration offenders, to deny them shelter and means of subsistence, and thereby make it more difficult for them to stay illegally in Singapore. Increase in number of persons arrested for marriage-of-convenience (MOC) related offences

The number of persons arrested for MOC-related offences in 2022 *increased from one to nine persons* compared to the year before. The nine arrests made in 2022 comprised four couples, and one person for arranging the MOC for one of the four couples. The foreign spouses had engaged in a MOC in order to prolong their stay in Singapore, with the local spouses receiving gratification in the form of money for assisting in the application for immigration facilities.

ICA takes a serious view of foreigners entering into MOCs with Singaporeans to obtain immigration facilities in Singapore. We will continue to take tough enforcement action against them and also the middlemen who facilitate MOCs. Enhancing operations and customer experience by transforming the way we work

New Clearance Concept (NCC): Enabling ICA to increase clearance throughput

In 2022, ICA kept up the pace of rolling out new initiatives as part of its flagship NCC project to transform our checkpoint operations, to better manage the increasing volume of travellers and goods.

NCC passenger clearance

In May 2022, ICA introduced the **Automated Clearance Initiative to allow eligible first-time foreign visitors to use automated lanes for arrival immigration clearance without a separate enrolment process**. By the end of 2022, more than 2.4 million foreign visitors had been enrolled.

charged (pending a conviction outcome) to better reflect ICA's enforcement efforts in arresting, investigating, and charging MOC offenders year on year.

- In December 2022, ICA introduced a *new automated lane the Special Assistance Lane (SAL)* at selected passenger halls in Changi Airport. The SAL enables travellers using a wheelchair and family groups of up to four persons (e.g. parents with young children) to enjoy the convenience of automated immigration clearance, and perform immigration self-clearance using biometric identifiers (iris and facial recognition). Singapore is the first country in the world to introduce an automated lane that allows multiple travellers to perform self-immigration clearance as a group. The SAL is currently available to Singapore residents and will be extended to eligible foreign visitors from March 2023.
- To expand our clearance capacity, ICA installed 125 additional automated lanes at our checkpoints in 2022, and is looking to install 61 more lanes in 2023.

NCC cargo clearance

- ICA has also introduced NCC Cargo, to provide a seamless, paperless, and secure cargo clearance process, supported by better detection capabilities which leverage data analytics and artificial intelligence. One of the NCC Cargo initiatives involves clearing *conventional cargo via the SG Arrival Card (SGAC) Cargo Module*. This was trialled at Air Cargo and Ports checkpoints in November 2021 and May 2022 respectively, and has been fully implemented at these checkpoints since January 2023.
- Drivers/freight forwarders simply need to submit their vehicle number and Cargo Clearance Permits (CCPs) via the SGAC Cargo Module before seeking cargo clearance at the checkpoints. ICA officers at the checkpoints will then retrieve the information transmitted to ICA's Cargo Screening System, without having to manually process each hardcopy CCP as was previously the modus operandi. This reduces clearance time by more than two minutes per vehicle. (Refer to Appendix B for quotes from stakeholders.)

23 Through greater use of digitalisation, biometrics, and automation, customers can now

transact with ICA at their convenience, anytime, anywhere.

24 From May 2022, the birth and death registration process has been made simpler, and

ICA now issues digital birth and death certificates instead of physical ones. With the

introduction of digital birth certificates, parents no longer need to make a trip to the hospital

or ICA Building to collect a physical birth certificate. The Government also streamlined the

death registration process to ease the administrative burden of post-death matters on

bereaved family members. The deceased's next-of-kin is now able to receive a digital death

certificate from the My Legacy portal after the death is certified by a registered medical

practitioner, without having to register the death. This allows the bereaved family to focus on

other matters in their time of grief.

Appendix A

Case #1 - Detection of duty-unpaid cigarettes at Pasir Panjang Scanning Station

On 24 June, ICA made the largest seizure of contraband in 2022 at the Pasir Panjang Scanning Station. 37,728 cartons of duty-unpaid cigarettes were transported in a container attempting to exit the Free Trade Zone. ICA officers had noticed anomalies in the scanned images of the container and directed it for further checks. The contraband was found concealed within large rolls of aluminum foil.



Case #2 - Detection of duty-unpaid cigarettes at Tuas Checkpoint

On 7 Nov 2022, ICA made the largest seizure of contraband at the land checkpoints. 12,852 cartons and 360 packets of duty-unpaid cigarettes were seized from a Malaysia-registered lorry arriving at Tuas Checkpoint. The smuggled contraband was concealed inside a consignment of box cartons.

Case #3 – Detection of electronic vaporisers and duty-unpaid cigarettes at Woodlands and Tuas Checkpoint in one night

On 29 Oct 2022, ICA officers at the Tuas and Woodlands Checkpoints foiled two smuggling attempts within the same night. At Woodlands Checkpoint, officers detected 1,260 pieces of e-vaporisers, refill pods, and related accessories concealed inside the convertible hood of a Singapore-registered car. Around two hours later, officers at Tuas Checkpoint detected 163 cartons and 40 packets of duty-unpaid cigarettes hidden in the speaker and make-shift bed within the cabin of a Malaysia-registered lorry transporting live poultry.



Case #4 – Officers at Parcel Post Section detected a parcel containing suspected drug paraphernalia

1 ICA officers at the Parcel Post Section detected a parcel containing suspected drug paraphernalia. CNB conducted follow-up operations and arrested a boy and a girl, both aged 16, for suspected drug trafficking offences in the vicinity of Bukit Batok Street 21. About 59g of cannabis and various drug paraphernalia were seized from the girl's home. ³ Three 14-year-

old and two 16-year-old teenagers were arrested by CNB for suspected drug trafficking and about 226g of cannabis (estimated to be worth close to \$7,000), food products believed to be infused with cannabis, and drug utensils were seized. The five teenagers were students from local and international schools.
